- You will need a copy of your transcript (ask guidance secretaries).
- If the school requests a Letter of Recommendation (not all do), this is completed through Naviance. Give <u>AT LEAST 3 WEEKS</u> notice to teachers/recommenders; start requesting NOW. <u>Letters of Recommendation can only be requested through Naviance</u> <u>AFTER the colleges you are interested in are added to your Naviance account.</u> This can be completed by:
 - o Using the Common App Match through Naviance, or
 - Manually entering them yourself on Naviance.
- You will want to choose <u>Early Action</u> or <u>Regular Decision</u> (Early Decision is for those who discussed this with their parents/guardians and school guidance counselor).
- Pay attention to deadlines. If Early Action deadline is Nov. 1, you should start this process at least 5-6 weeks ahead.

The name/email of the person who will submit a Letter of Rec on your behalf. Do not list anyone you haven't talked to first. For Non-Wallkill recommenders/teachers (e.g., Boces Teachers, Outside Athletic Coach/Mentor, etc.), these requests ARE done through the Common App ONLY.

The 9 Most Important Things to Know When Filling Out the Common App

- 1. Colleges want to know what your parents/guardians do and their level of education to get a sense of your background. your background helps to frame your application.
- 2. When you are asked to self-report your rank and GPA under "Education", have your transcript next to you and be honest. Colleges will be looking at what you report and match it to your official transcript.
- 3. Fill out the section for "Current and Most Recent Year Courses". If you drop a course or replace it, you will need to notify every college you applied to. Selective institutions don't like it when a student reduces the rigor in their senior year courses.
- 4. Always lead with your core, academic classes first when listing them in your application. These classes matter more than non-academic classes like Phys Ed., Health, or elective classes.
- 5. You only have space to indicate five academic honors. Choose carefully. If you don't have any honors to report, that's okay.
- 6. Look at your college list and determine how each college wants to receive test scores. Some colleges permit or even require self-reporting. This allows a student to simply list their SAT or ACT scores right on their application in the testing section. Other colleges still require official score reports from the College Board or ACT, fees may apply.
- 7. Under "Activities", you only have room to list ten things you do in your free time. Be thoughtful about what you include. It's not about how many activities you list; it's about the level of commitment and/or impact you have made. Make sure you list activities in order of importance: #1 should be the most important activity you do.
- 8. The main essay is typically required at most intuitions. If a college indicates that the main essay is optional, we would recommend sending it.
- 9. Be very mindful when using the "Additional Information" section. Only use this section if it is absolutely necessary. This section should be used to explain how certain extenuating circumstances negatively impacted someone's grades and test scores or how they may have affected one's ability to participate in certain extracurricular activities (e.g., unexpected life events, family or personal illness, etc.)
